What is a citation?

A citation is information which fully identifies a publication. A complete citation usually includes author, title, name of journal, and date. Often pages, volumes and other information will be included in a citation. How this information is ordered and formatted depends on the citation style preferred.

What is the Journal Locator?

The Journal Locator is a tool that allows you to search from a single search box, all the journal titles we have access to either in print or electronic. You can search by title or discipline and it displays not only the titles, but what years are available

Why is the Journal Locator useful when all you have is a citation?

A citation will tell you where the article you want is published—what journal it is published in. The Journal Locator will reveal whether or not Musselman Library has access to that journal title.

If you do not find the journal in the Journal Locator, then you can borrow the article from another library; it's called an "interlibrary loan." Use ILLiad to make your request.

What is ILLiad?

ILLiad is software that enables you to create and access your own accounts from wherever you have access to a web browser. After completing an initial profile, you only need to key in your user ID and password to make an interlibrary loan request. Oftentimes your requests are delivered electronically to your account. It's fast and convenient.
